In its latest production of "Additional Particulars," cast and audience members will most certainly agree, as this laughable comedy shines a humorous light on small town life.

Winning critical acclaim nationwide, the playwright Ed Simpson brings his quirky comedy to the local stage this weekend, as three productions of "Additional Particulars" will kick off on Friday night.

Another tale of lives intertwined unfolds, but the light-hearted drama takes place within the borders of the local

"Save-a-Bundle Discount Mart."

From a bit of flirtatious conversation to some real-life let downs, it's a show perfect for all ages.

"I think this is an amazing and heartwarming view of how four employees of Save-a-Bundle Discount Mart cope with life's uncertainties. It's real-life, everyday humor. Come laugh with me," said Kristy McElroy, executive director at OCT.

In the first act, a fun-loving, glass-half-full kind of girl, Glenda Balitski, played by Katheryn Woolbright, continues to navigate her territory at Save-a-Bundle in housewares.

She's recently been granted a new lease on life after the death of her invalid mother. While enjoying the perks of making her new apartment a home of her own, she's greeted with a surprise visitor.

Warren Grippo, played by Lee Goza, the store's assistant manager, pops in to deliver some unexpected — yet appreciated — news at Balitski's new place.

Grippo reveals that she has been chosen for "Employee of the Month," but the conversation

doesn't end there. He confesses his desire to discuss with her some "additional particulars" of a more personal nature.

The play received recognition with the LA Drama Critics Circle Award, Backstage West's Garland Award and was a Critic's Choice in the LA Times.
