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As the heat lingered in the air Thursday night, Upstate residents flocked to the fairgrounds along U.S. 123 to tackle the rides, take in the sights and feast on the classic fair food.

The 47th annual Upper South Carolina State Fair kicked off and will run through Sept. 12. Tens of thousands of visitors are expected.

Thursday was a first for one.

on tight to a ride with a big grin on her face.
